From the Pastor

Phase One of our ReVision journey is complete. The congregational survey was conducted on June 11. The surveys have been tabulated, and together with the demographics from the geographic area we specified, our Context Report has been received.



Phase Two consists of the series of eight mission study sessions. The response to the first two sessions has been excellent. Each of the sessions focuses on different aspects of vision and mission, and each session builds on the previous sessions. Since not everyone can make it to all of the sessions, we are working hard to post summaries and power point slides on the church website, and include the summaries in the Friday E Reports. If neither of these ways of sharing the information works for you, let us know, and we can get it to you some other way directly.

Perhaps the best aspect of making this journey is its reminder that vision arises from attending to a gap, the gap between what is (in our congregation and our community) and what ought to be. The what ought to be is not more members, more programs or more money. The what ought to be is what God desires: wholeness and abundant life. God wants us and our community to be whole and fully alive. What might that look like? That is what we are working to discern.



Of course, we want to grow numerically and spiritually. The question is how to go about it. Agriculture might offer a helpful metaphor. The church growth movement was like Monsanto, and its advocates said we could rely on “chemical solutions.” We could use Miracle Grow, or some other wonder fertilizer, along with powerful herbicides and pesticides, and have a big, thriving monoculture.

What many of us are realizing are the unwanted consequences of the chemical, artificial solutions, for both agriculture and Christianity. Organic, smaller-scale approaches do not have the unwanted consequences, and in fact, restore and maintain the overall health of the ecosystem.

One could also think of this in terms of athletics. How do you want to win? Chemicals can help, such as any number of performance enhancing drugs (PEDs). In the case of cycling, you can even do things with your blood (blood doping) to improve performance. Rightly, I believe, Major League Baseball, the International Olympic Committee, and international cycling have decided that using PEDs and doping are bad. Turns out that winning is not the only thing. How you do it matters.



I have come to understand so much of what mega churches do in these terms. Worship, for them, has become an industry, and it is

big business, with sales in music, books, videos and conferences. The experiences they offer on Sundays are religious spectacles, which act like a kind of spiritual PED. Size, or popularity, cannot be the only measure of a church's faithfulness. Other measures matter, too.

A missional approach to ministry offers an "organic" way of following Jesus today. How can we grow, and remain true to our religious heritage, our ecumenical commitments and the call of Jesus? We can do that by embodying the way of Jesus, by being salt and light, as Jesus said, by being a sign and foretaste of the realm of God.



The challenges that can undermine or sidetrack discernment are many. Each of us has our own wants and desires and needs. Shall we follow only the strongest voices? Our congregation already offers good ways to be involved in ministry. How do we balance maintaining the good with new possibilities that will also be good? Then there are the temptations posed by "simple answers" or "easy solutions." Other, bigger, churches are doing this or that. Shouldn't we try this or that, too?



When it comes to vision, there are no easy answers. The Gospels make this clear. "Jesus, you are hungry. Use your God-given power and turn these stones into bread." Was that what it meant for Jesus to be the Messiah? "Jesus, you want to get everyone to follow you. Great! People love spectacles. So, just get up on the steeple of the Temple, where everyone can see you, then throw

yourself off. God's angels will catch you, and everyone will be so amazed and see that, obviously, you are the Son of God." Put God to the test? Was that what God had in mind for Jesus?

If we want to remain authentic, then we have to do the work of discernment. Gil Rendle, a distinguished thinker and consultant who has for four decades helped churches face change, was interviewed last year and was asked specifically about what he has gleaned now that he is nearing retirement. One of his biggest gleanings is that he no longer

thinks that it is useful to develop basic principles for all congregations to follow, some sort of master template. Our contexts are too fluid, and change is happening too rapidly for that approach to be effective. He said, "Every day you get up, your situation has changed from the way it was before. And so how do you lead when everything doesn't hold still?"

What this means is each congregation now has to work together to discern its vision, and the ministries that arise from that vision. Which is such good news for Presbyterians,



for one of our beloved hallmarks is our conviction that we discern the mind of Christ together. Session and I are counting on all of you to walk the journey with us, to pray, to get a copy of the context report and contemplate its findings, to share in the remaining mission study sessions, to voice your sense of what the Holy Spirit may be prodding us to do, or where it may be leading us to go.

The mission study sessions continue through Sunday, September 17. Phase Three will then begin. The ReVision Team will take the context report, the insights gained from the mission study sessions, and our own insights and perceptions, and go on a brief retreat. During the retreat, the team will draft a proposed vision which will offer ministry and program goals and objectives for the next three years. Session will consider the proposed vision and then move to adopt it, as is or as amended.

The call to prayer stands in earnest. Pray for the Spirit to tenderize our hearts and minds so that we may be perceptive. Pray for the ReVision Team as it does its work. Pray that God will grant wisdom and courage to session. Pray for all of us together that God grant us the courage to follow where the Spirit wants to lead us. So may it be.

ReVision Mission Study Sessions



The ReVision Team is pleased to report on our progress. Phase One is complete! Now we are in the midst of Phase Two, which consists of a series of eight mission study sessions. By doing things this way, planning becomes a process of spiritual discernment and faith development as we grow to understand ourselves and our community in a deeper way.

Mission Study Sessions are being offered on Sundays beginning at 11:00 a.m. in Fellowship Hall. We have sessions three through eight remaining (August 13, 20, 27, September 3, 10, and 17). We will reflect on the nature and role of vision in the life of faith. We will work on defining our gap, visualizing our mission, bringing down barriers, and keeping the main thing the main thing.

The Lord's Prayer in Sunday Worship

Ever wonder why the different parts of Sunday worship happen where they do in the order? Many of us do. Take the Lord's Prayer. We recite it each Sunday because it has been of central importance to disciples from at least the second century. When new converts were welcomed into the fellowship of the church, they were given specific gifts. First, a white robe to symbolize the forgiveness of their sins and their new life in Christ. Second, the baptismal creed, which eventually became the Apostles' Creed. The new disciples memorized it and explored its meaning with wise teachers. Third, the Lord's Prayer, which new disciples also memorized and contemplated with instruction. The creed and the Lord's Prayer were thought of like tangible things which were handed on to the new disciples. Once in the heart and the mind, the creed and the Lord's Prayer could be relied on whenever, and wherever, needed.



We say the Lord's Prayer where we do in the order of service because it has long been connected to the Eucharist. After the prayers of the people, we make our offering, and along with our financial gifts, our offering of bread and cup are brought forward and placed on the Table. Just as we do in our own homes, once the Table is set, we give thanks. At this Table, however, we experience the grace of God in an exceptional way, and that is why this prayer is called the Great Thanksgiving. The Great Thanksgiving is followed by the Lord's Prayer, which makes perfect sense given that the third sentence of the prayer is "Give us this day our daily bread..." The Lord's Prayer is followed by the Fraction where the pastor breaks the bread and pours the cup and invites the faithful to receive the elements. "The gifts of God for the people of God."

Three (or four) Sundays of the month we do not celebrate communion, yet we still recite the Lord's Prayer. On those

Sundays, the prayer follows the offering, the bringing forward of our gifts, and the prayer of thanksgiving (or dedication). That these parts of the service remain every Sunday, they remind us that something is missing when we do not celebrate communion. Acts 2:42 suggests that those first disciples celebrated communion every Lord's Day, and the historical record suggests that weekly Eucharist continued for 500 or 600 years. The Reformers, including Martin Luther, Thomas Cranmer and John Calvin, wanted to recover the practice of weekly communion. Due to the patient work of the Ecumenical Movement, more and more of our Presbyterian churches are completing this aspect of the work of the Reformation. Until it is completed, reciting the Lord's Prayer where we do in the service reminds us that something is missing, which may then provoke another question. Why don't we celebrate communion each week? Now that is a good question!



Pastor's Circle Group

The Pastor's Circle group was created in 2016 at the request of our interim pastor, the Rev. Deborah Owen. The group serves as a confidential sounding board for the pastor, where questions or concerns voiced by church members or by the pastor can be shared. The Circle Group supports the pastor, prays for the pastor and our church, and strives to keep communications open between the pastor and the congregation. Group members serve a two-year term are suggested by the pastor, by church members, or by self-nomination. The circle includes active members who regularly attend worship and are connected to other members. It meets quarterly or otherwise at the request of the pastor.

Other important aspects of the Pastor's Circle Group:

- * Confidentiality is required.
- * The group is accountable to session by way of the personnel committee.
- * The group includes a mix of genders, ages, newer members, and long-time members.

The Rev. David Oliver-Holder and the Circle Group met for the first time in July. Our current members are the Rev. David Oliver-Holder, Camille Caldwell, Jason Harris, David Morse, Nancy Morse, Susan Silver, and Jamie Peterson (liaison to Personnel Committee). Church members are always encouraged to speak directly to the pastor about any issue of concern, but please feel free to talk to a group member anytime you have a concern or question you would like to be raised.

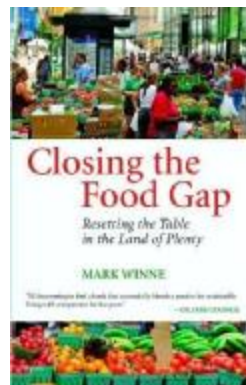




“Closing the Gap” Book Study
